STUDENT LEARNING CONFERENCES



WHAT ARE STUDENT LEARNING CONFERENCES?

A student-learning conference is a preplanned meeting in which students demonstrate responsibility for their academic performance by providing a review of their work for parents/guardians and teachers.

The student leads the conference by presenting work samples and discussing their learning.





WHY ARE WE DOING THIS?

- Increased student engagement, as students take on more ownership of their learning.
- Teachers, students, and parents/guardians can work together to develop plans for continuous learning and student growth.
- Teachers establish a stronger working relationship with parents/guardians and students.
- To improve our students' communication skills, and to provide opportunities for selfreflection and goal setting.

ROLE OF EACH MEMBER AT THE CONFERENCE

STUDENT

- Share and discuss learning with their parents/guardians.
- Identify strengths and learning goals with teachers and parents/guardians.
- Connect their learning to longterm goals.
- Determine next steps to improve learning.

PARENT/GUARDIAN

- Provide encouragement, praise, and reinforcement.
- Assist their child in identifying strengths and learning goals.
- Work with their child and teachers to determine the next steps for learning.

TEACHER

- Act as a guide and offer positive feedback.
- Identify new learning goals with students and parents/guardians.
- Inquire about students' longterm goals.
- Assist students and parents/guardians in determining the next steps for learning.
